I. Purpose

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is issuing this Notice to noncompetitively renew or replace Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program (YHDP) grants for YHDP projects that were not submitted for consideration under the *Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for Fiscal Year (FY 2023) Continuum of Care Competition and Renewal or Replacement of Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program Grants* (2023 CoC competition, FR-67000-N-25) under the Continuum of Care (CoC) program for one 12-month period. Renewal amounts will be adjusted to account for changes in Fair Market Rent (FMR) as applicable.

The goal of YHDP is to support the development and implementation of a coordinated community approach to preventing and ending youth homelessness and sharing that experience with and mobilizing communities around the country toward the same end. The population to be served by the demonstration program is youth ages 24 and younger experiencing homelessness, including unaccompanied and pregnant or parenting youth.

The CoC Program is designed to promote a community-wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness; to provide funding for efforts by nonprofit providers, states, and local governments to quickly rehouse homeless individuals, families, persons fleeing domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking; and youth while minimizing the trauma and dislocation caused by homelessness; to promote access to and effective utilization of mainstream programs by homeless individuals and families; and to optimize self-sufficiency among those experiencing homelessness.

II. Summary

A. Overview

- Federal Agency Name: Department of Housing and Urban Development, Office of Community Planning and Development.
- Authority: The CoC Program is authorized by subtitle C of title IV of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, (42 U.S.C. 11381–11389) (the Act), and the CoC Program rule found in 24 CFR part 578 (the Rule). The Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 funds were provided by the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 (Public Law 117-328, approved December 29, 2022) (FY 2023 HUD Appropriations Act).
- 3. Publication: This Notice is initially being published on HUD's website.
- 4. Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) Number: 14.267 Continuum of Care Program.
- 5. Funds Available: Approximately \$1 million will be used to renew or replace YHDP projects originally funded using FY2017 or later funds that did not apply under 2023 CoC competition. Funds remaining from prior year appropriations may be utilized to fully renew or replace eligible awards. HUD is not soliciting or accepting new project applications.

B. Eligibility and Funding Process

1. FY 2023 YHDP Renewal or Replacement Awards. The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023 provides that HUD may competitively or non-competitively renew or replace grants for YDP projects under the CoC program. Using this authority, HUD non-competitively renewed or replaced all eligible YHDP projects with reviewable applications that were originally funded with FY2017 or later YHDP funds through the 2023 CoC competition. Several YHDP projects that were eligible to be renewed or replaced noncompetitively are included in the geographic area of a CoC that did not submit the required application materials in the 2023 CoC competition and the YHDP projects were not renewed or replaced as a result. Therefore, HUD is utilizing its authority under the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, to renew or replace these projects noncompetitively through this supplemental notice.

HUD has identified six projects that were eligible to be non-competitively renewed or replaced in the 2023 CoC competition that were not submitted to HUD. These projects are listed in Appendix A of this Notice.

Regardless of whether the project is included in Appendix A, YHDP-funded organizations with YHDP projects that are eligible for renewal or replacement that were not submitted for consideration in the 2023 CoC competition can request to have their YHDP project non-competitively renewed or replaced by notifying HUD via email as soon as possible, but no later than October 2, 2024. - 2. Fair Market Rent (FMR) Adjustments. Consistent with the Act and CoC regulations at 24 CFR 578.17(b), HUD will adjust the renewal amount for leasing, operating costs, and rental assistance for permanent housing based on the FY 2024 published FMR amounts for the applicable unit size and configuration.
- *3. Grant Agreements.* HUD will prepare and send the FY 2023 1-year grant agreement to the authorized contact person for each recipient via email for signature. Recipients are to return the signed grant agreement to the field office within 30 days upon receipt.

Once the HUD field office receives the signed grant agreement from the recipient, the FY 2023 funds will be released for the project.

See 24 CFR 578.93(c) for the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing requirements that apply to the CoC program. The Rule details the requirements with which grants awarded under this non-competitive process must comply. Regulatory citations are provided below so applicants can refer to specific areas of 24 CFR part 578.

B. Definitions and Concepts.

- The definitions and concepts contained in this section include terms that are important for recipients to understand the CoC Program.
 - Definitions from 24 CFR 578.3. For the purposes of this Notice, the definitions in 24 CFR 578.3 apply.
 - a. Recipient
 - b. Subrecipient
 - c. Unified Funding Agency (UFA)
 - *d. Collaborative Applicant.* Collaborative Applicant is defined in 24 CFR 578.3. Under this Notice, the Collaborative Applicant is the entity designated by the CoC to continue the ongoing activities and planning needs of the CoC Program in the CoC's geographic area. As set forth in 24 CFR 578.3, the Collaborative Applicant is the only entity that can receive CoC planning funds, and, if the Collaborative Applicant is designated as a UFA by HUD, UFA funds.

2. CoC Program Notice Concepts.

The following terms are not found in 24 CFR 578.3 but may be found in other areas of the Rule or is used in this Notice to define concepts that pertain specifically to the FY 2023 funding process.

 a. *Eligible YHDP Renewal Project*. A project that will be under grant agreement by December 31, 2023 and will have an expiration date in CY 2024 (between January 1, 2024 and December 31, 2024). b. YHDP Replacement Project. The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, permits the replacement of eligible YHDP renewal projects under the CoC Program; therefore, renewing YHDP projects may be replaced with new YHDP projects that may wholly or in part include activities ineligible under the CoC Program if the replacement project demonstrates it will directly serve youth aged 24 and under experiencing homelessness. CoCs may replace a renewing YHDP project to create one or more YHDP Replacement projects.

3. Lead-Based Paint Requirements.

When providing housing assistance funding for purchase, lease, support services, operation, or work that may disturb painted surfaces, of pre-1978 housing, you must comply with the lead-based paint evaluation and hazard reduction requirements of HUD's lead-based paint rules (Lead Disclosure and Lead Safe Housing (24 CFR part 35)), and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) lead-based paint rules (e.g., Renovation, Repair, and Painting; Pre-Renovation Education; and Lead Training and Certification (40 CFR part 745)).

When providing education or counseling on buying or renting housing that may include pre-1978 housing, applicants must inform participants of their rights under the Lead Disclosure Rule (24 CFR part 36, subpart A), and, if the focus or the education or counseling is on rental or purchase of HUD-assisted pre-1978 housing, the Lead Safe Housing Rule (subparts B, R, and, as applicable, F-M).

4. Environmental Requirements.

Notwithstanding 24 CFR 578.31 and 24 CFR 578.99(a) of the Rule, and in accordance with Section 100261(3) of MAP-21 (Pub. L. 112-141, 126 Stat. 405), activities under this Notice are subject to environmental review by a responsible entity under HUD regulations at 24 CFR part 58 or by HUD under 24 CFR part 50.

a. Two types of projects are Categorically Excluded from review under the National Environmental Policy Act and not subject to the laws and authorities listed under 24 CFR 58.5 (CENST): All scattered-site projects where program participants choose their own unit and are not restricted to units within a pre-determined specific project site, or sites are categorized in 24 CFR 58.35(b)(1) as CENST. This includes both tenant-based rental assistance and tenant-based scattered-site leasing projects where program participants choose their own unit. An Exempt/CENST environmental review determination addressing the laws and authorities at 24 CFR part 58.6 is only required for each project, not every unit.

b. For activities under a grant to a recipient other than a responsible entity (a state, Tribe, or unit of general local government) that generally would be subject to review under 24 CFR part 58, under 24 CFR 58.11, HUD may perform the environmental review under the provisions of 24 CFR part 50.

c. Irrespective of whether the responsible entity in accordance with 24 CFR part 58 (or HUD in accordance with 24 CFR part 50) performs the environmental review, the recipient must supply all available, relevant information necessary for the responsible entity (or HUD, if applicable) to perform for each property any required environmental review. The recipient also must carry out mitigating measures required by the responsible entity (or HUD, if applicable) or select alternative property.

d. The recipient, its project partners, and their contractors may not acquire, rehabilitate, convert, lease, repair, dispose of, demolish, or construct property for a project under this Notice, or commit or expend HUD or Non-HUD funds for such eligible activities under this Notice, until the responsible entity (as defined by 24 CFR 58.2(a)(7)) has completed the environmental review procedures required by 24 CFR part 58 and the environmental certification and Request for Release of Funds (RROF) have been approved or HUD has performed an environmental review under 24 CFR part 50 and the recipient has received HUD approval of the proposed activity. HUD will not release grant funds if the recipient or any other party commits grant funds (i.e., incurs any costs or expenditures to be paid or reimbursed with such funds) before the recipient submits and HUD approves its RROF (where such submission is required).

5. Applicable CoC Regulations

All YHDP Renewal and replacement projects are subject to the following provisions of the Rule, as may be amended from time to time, except where they conflict with the requirements in the Notice of Funding Opportunity for Fiscal Year 2023 Continuum of Care Competition and Renewal or Replacement of Youth Homeless Demonstration Program Grants (FY2023 CoC NOFO), with the special YHDP activities identified in section III.B.4.b.(6) of the FY2023 CoC NOFO, or the requirement that grant funds may only be used to serve homeless youth, age 24 and younger: 24 CFR 578.3, 578.15, 578.23(a), 578.25, 578.27, 578.29, 578.37, 578.43, 578.45, 578.47, 578.49, 578.51, 578.53, 578.55, 578.57, 578.59, 578.61, 578.63, 578.73(c), 578.75, 578.77, 578.79, 578.81, 578.83, 578.85, 578.87, 578.89, 578.89, 578.91, 578.93, 578.95, 578.97, 578.99, 578.103(a)(3) - (18) and (b) - (e), 578.105, 578.107 and 578.109. The requirements of 2 CFR 200.306, as may be amended from time to time, with the exception of 200.306(b)(5) apply. All YHDP Renewal and replacement projects must comply with 24 CFR 578.93, except that in 578.93(c)(2), recipients must provide such information to the jurisdiction in which the project is located. Federal fair housing and nondiscrimination requirements cannot be waived.

IV. Renewal Projects, Replacement Projects, and Awards

As stated in Section II, this Notice only renews or replaces YHDP projects expiring in CY 2024 (between January 1, 2024, and December 31, 2024). Grant terms are limited to 1-year of funding under this Notice. HUD may extend the grant term consistent with 2 CFR 200.308 and 2 CFR 200.309.

1. Match

24 CFR 578.73(c) applies to YHDP projects and provides information regarding match requirements. HUD will not require YHDP Renewal or replacement projects to meet the 25 percent match requirement if the applicant is able to demonstrate it has taken reasonable steps to maximize resources available for youth experiencing homelessness.

2. Special YHDP Activities

Section III.B.4.b.6.a of the Notice of Funding Opportunity for Fiscal Year 2023 Continuum of Care Competition and Renewal or Replacement of Youth Homeless Demonstration Program Grants outlines special YHDP activities that can be utilized by recipients of YHDP renewal and replacement grants upon notification to HUD. Some of these activities may already be utilized in the existing projects listed in Appendix A. HUD will renew these projects with any existing Special Activities listed under Section III.B.4.b.6.a. Projects utilizing activities under Section III.B.4.b.6.b or recipients who would like to add special activities must contact their CPD Field Office, obtain HUD approval for the special activity, and if necessary, amend their grant agreement.

3. Indirect Costs

Normal indirect cost rules under 2 CFR part 200, as may be amended from time to time, apply. Recipients that intend to charge indirect costs to the award must submit to the local HUD field office the rate and distribution base the recipient intends to use, and, if applicable, the rate and distribution base to be used by a subrecipient(s). If the rate is a Federally negotiated indirect cost rate, the recipient must include the corresponding negotiated indirect cost rate agreement signed by the cognizant agency. A government department or agency unit that receives no more than \$35 million in direct federal funding per year and has developed and maintains an indirect cost rate proposal and supporting documentation in accordance with 2 CFR part 200, appendix VII, may use the rate and distribution base specified in that indirect cost rate proposal, unless the cognizant agency requires the proposal to be submitted for negotiation.

Each recipient or subrecipient that meets the conditions for the de minimis rate under 2CFR 200.414(f) and will use that rate to charge indirect costs, the project application must clearly state the intended use of the de minimis rate. As described in 2 CFR 200.403, costs must be consistently charged as either indirect or direct costs but may not be double charged or inconsistently charged as both. Once an organization elects to use the de minimis rate, the organization must apply this methodology consistently for all Federal awards until the organization chooses to negotiate for a rate, which the organization may apply to do at any time. Documentation of the decision to use the de minimis rate must be retained on file for audit.

4. Activities not Allowed for YHDP projects non-competitively renewed or replaced through this Notice

As the process for awarding these YHDP funds is non-competitive, recipients of funding through this Notice are not permitted to apply for a grant consolidation of two or more YHDP grants.

Further, the following activities are not available to YHDP projects awarded funding under this Notice:

- 1. New projects that are not YHDP replacement projects;
- 2. Expansions
- **3.** Transition grants
- 4. Reallocation
- 5. Solo Appeals

Other Guidance and Notifications

1. Federalism. E.O. 13132 prohibits, to the extent practicable and permitted by law, an agency from promulgating policies that have federalism implications and either impose substantial direct compliance costs on state and local governments and are not required by statute, or preempt state

law, unless the relevant requirements of Section 6 of the executive order are met. This notice does not have federalism implications and does not impose substantial direct compliance costs on state and local governments or preempt state law within the meaning of the executive order.

2. Section 102 of the HUD Reform Act. Section 102 of the Department of Housing and Urban Development Reform Act of 1989 (HUD Reform Act) (42 U.S.C. 3545) and the regulations codified at 24 CFR 4, subpart A, contain several requirements that are designed to ensure greater accountability and integrity in the provision of certain types of assistance administered by HUD. On January 14, 1992, HUD published a notice that also provides information on the implementation of Section 102 (57 FR 1942). The documentation, public access, and disclosure requirements of Section 102 apply to assistance awarded under NOFOs published as described below:

a. Documentation, Public Access, and Disclosure Requirements. HUD will ensure that documentation and other information regarding each application submitted pursuant to a FY 2022 NOFO are sufficient to indicate the basis upon which assistance was provided or denied. This material, including any letters of support, will be made available for public inspection for a 5-year period beginning not less than 30 days after the award of the assistance. Material will be made available in accordance with the FOIA and HUD's implementing regulations at 24 CFR 15.

b. Form HUD 2880, "Applicant/Recipient Disclosure/Update Report". HUD will also make available to the public for a period of 5 years all applicant disclosure reports (form HUD 2880) submitted in connection with a FY 2022 NOFO. Updated reports (also reported on form HUD 2880) will be made available along with the applicant disclosure reports, but in no case for a period of less than 3 years. All reports will be made available in accordance with the FOIA and HUD's implementing regulations.

c. Publication of Recipients of Funding. HUD's regulations at 24 CFR part 4 provide that HUD will publish a notice in the Federal Register to notify the public of all funding decisions made by HUD to provide: (1) Assistance subject to Section 102(a) of the HUD Reform Act; and (2) Assistance provided through grants or cooperative agreements on a discretionary (nonformula, non-demand) noncompetitive basis.

4. **Digital Signatures and Recordkeeping**. HUD is increasing electronic recordkeeping where feasible. HUD plans to use digital signatures on grant award and modification documents to expedite awards and modification. HUD will manage email records in an electronic format. Recipients need not print emails and file them if their email system and procedures meet records management and litigation requirements (e.g., identifying, retrieving, and retaining the records for as long as they are needed).

V. Award Administration Information

A. Reporting

HUD requires recipients to submit performance and financial reports under OMB guidance and program instructions.

1. Recipient Integrity and Performance Matters

Applicants should be aware that if the total Federal share of their Federal award includes more than \$500,000 over the period of performance, the award will be subject to post award reporting requirements reflected in Appendix XII to 2 CFR part 200, Award Terms and Conditions for Recipient Integrity and Performance Matters.

2. Race, Ethnicity and Other Data Reporting

HUD requires recipients that provide HUD-funded program benefits to individuals or families to report data on the race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, disability, and family characteristics of persons and households who are applicants for, participants in, or beneficiaries or potential beneficiaries of HUD programs in order to carry out the Department's responsibilities under the Fair Housing Act, Executive Order 11063, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and Section 562 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1987. These authorities prohibit discrimination in housing and in programs receiving financial assistance from the Department and direct the Secretary to administer the Department's programs and activities in a manner affirmatively to further these policies and to collect certain data to assess the extent of compliance with these policies. Each recipient shall keep such records and submit to the Department timely, complete, and accurate compliance reports at such times, and in such form and containing such information, as the Department may determine to be necessary to enable it to ascertain whether the recipient has complied or is complying with 24 CFR parts 1 and 121. In general, recipients should have available for the Department data showing the demographics of beneficiaries of federally-assisted programs.

3. Compliance with the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (Pub. L. 109-282) as amended (FFATA)

FFATA requires information on federal awards be made available to the public via a single, searchable website, which is www.USASpending.gov. Accordingly, each award HUD makes under this Notice will be subject to the requirements provided by the Award Term in Appendix A to 2 CFR part 170, "REPORTINGSUBAWARD AND EXECUTIVE COMPENSATION INFORMATION," unless the Federal funding for the award (including funding that may be added through amendments) is not expected to equal or exceed \$30,000. Requirements under this Award Term include filing subaward information in the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA) Sub-award Reporting System (FSRS.gov) by the end of the month following the month in which the recipient awards any sub-grant equal to or greater than \$30,000.

4. Program-Specific Reporting Requirements

a. In accordance with program regulations at 24 CFR 578.103, project recipients must maintain records within the timeframe required, make any reports, including those pertaining to race, ethnicity, gender, and disability status that HUD may require. Project recipients may report the data as part of their APR submission to HUD. Also, project

recipients who expend \$750,000 or more in 1 year in federal awards must have a single or program-specific audit for that year in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR part 200, subpart F.

b. Section 3 Reporting Regulations. Recipients are required to report their Section 3 activities per 24 CFR 75.25 if funds were awarded for housing rehabilitation, housing construction, and other public constructions. See HUD's Section 3 website for additional information including annual reporting requirements.

c. Award notices may also include requirements for sub-award reporting in compliance with the requirements of the Federal Financial Assistance Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (Pub. L. 109-282) (FFATA) and Section 872 of the Duncan Hunter National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2009 (Pub. L. 110-417), referred to as "Section 872." See the General Section for further information
